Why We Use the Lectionary* *Except for the Next Three Weeks

"What will you be preaching on next Sunday?" It's amazing how many times I've been asked that question in the few years I've had the privilege of being the pastor at Joy. Sometimes the question comes from a curious church member, but more often the question is posed to me by a friend from outside the Joy community. The assumption they're typically making is that pastors are either preaching (1) a sermon series planned weeks if not months in advance or (2) preaching straight through a particular book of the Bible. So, when I answer this question by saying, "I don't know," it often catches people off guard. After all, how can I not know what book we're working through or what 12-week sermon series we're in the middle of?

The truth is that if you ask me on Sunday afternoon what the topic will be next week I will rarely have an answer for you off the top of my head. However, while I may not be able to instantly tell you what the topic is for next Sunday, I can, with minimal effort, tell you that if you happen to be in church on Sunday, May 9, 2049, I will almost certainly be preaching on John 10:22–30. How can I tell you what my sermon text will likely be 30 years in advance? Because we typically follow the lectionary.

The lectionary is a list that assigns Scripture readings to each Sunday in the church year. We typically use the lectionary here at Joy for two reasons. First, the lectionary assigns readings that make sense given where we are in the church year. Are we in Advent preparing for Christmas? The lectionary assigns readings focused on preparing for Christ's birth. Are we in Easter celebrating the resurrection? The lectionary assigns readings that talk about Jesus's post-resurrection appearances. Second, the lectionary helps to ensure that I don't shortchange you by only giving you part of God's word. Like you, I too have favorite Bible verses and topics I like to talk about. If we didn't use the lectionary, I would be free to talk to you about these verses and topics all the time but, if I did that, you'd get a very unbalanced diet of God's Word. The lectionary makes sure you get a balanced diet of God's word by making sure you hear readings from throughout Scripture and not just part of it.

For these two reasons we typically follow the lectionary at Joy. . . . except for the next three weeks. For the middle three weeks of September I'm planning a sermon series focusing on children and faith. That's right, I just got done telling you why we use the lectionary and now I'm telling you we won't be following it for the next few weeks. I must admit, I'm excited to do a short sermon series with you all, but I'm also glad to know that by the end of September we'll be back on the lectionary. I desire for you to hear the full counsel of God and the lectionary makes sure you hear just that.
